Rangiora Museum 29 Goode Street Sunday 24th April 2.pm



We are in for a treat on this visit. The Museum has a video showing some of the early Rangiora houses that we are going to view, so if you have an interest in old houses or family connections to the area then this is the visit for you.

It didn't take long for Rangiora to become well established after Kaiapoi. Kaiapoi being a really busy port in the 1870's and 1880's, the main track out there from Kaiapoi was along Tram Road I believe.

The Museum is interesting in itself. It used to be the top floor of the old BNZ Bank building in Rangiora. When the BNZ was demolished in 1967 the top floor was saved and moved to the present site to become the Rangiora Museum.

There is a plethora of fascinating items in the Museum and I'm sure we will all be able to find something of interest as they cover a large range.

Parking is not too difficult on a Sunday around there and there are numerous coffee shops that we can adjourn to afterwards for a chat and catch up. Coffee Culture is handy and within walking distance if it is fine or you can drive there if you choose.




The Tapley's Store and House that was burnt down.

Having grown up in Governors Bay, and mixing with his uncles and aunts, her husband knew a lot about the history of the area. With about 14 descendants interred in St Cuthberts Cemetery , it is a place they have strong links with.

June19 Mid winter Lunch Craythornes Hotel 344 Halswell Road 11.30 for12 midday \$40 per person




Come along and join us for a meal at Craythornes, it will be a chance to relax, catch your breath and enjoy some good food and good company. Craythornes is just about opposite the little old St Mary's Church in Halswell on the Main Road. It will be familiar to most of us from when we used to meet in Halswell at the Library. It has recently changed hands so they are eager to please.

Craythornes first opened on this site in a sod hut with a thatched roof and dirt floor in 1863 as an ale house run by Mary and William Craythorne. In an annex, behind the building, William brewed a draught ale from a recipe he brought with him from England. Mary opened the business, which became known by locals as Mother Craythorne's pub. I have always maintained that being a pioneer was a thirsty business. It has come a long way since then!

Herbert Hillsborough Garland NZ Army Service Corps, 14th reinforcement.

Born 17 February 1888 Fair hair, Fair complexion Grey eyes, Good character Enlisted 10 March 1916

Like a lot of young men Herbert did not give his correct date of birth when he was called up for service, he became two years younger. He was the youngest son of Joseph and Mary Ann Garland of Chapman Road, Hillsborough, Christchurch. The photo shows Herbert with a niece and nephew before he left NZ. Herbert embarked on the SS Tahiti for the UK, disembarking at

Devonport after about 6 weeks at sea, and marched to Camp Sling. Herbert served as a driver in Camp Sling. He was injured there, losing the sight in one eye which resulted in him being discharged from duty and returned to New Zealand as an invalid on the SS Rotorua, having served 197 days overseas. Herbert died on 31 May 1926 when he drowned on the West Coast, crossing the Grey River Bar in a boating accident. He never married. His sister Ellen Mary Scott died in 1921, and his father Joseph died in 1923. Mary Ann his mother devastated by the deaths of her daughter, husband and youngest son in such quick succession died in 1928. Fortunately she did not know that her one remaining child, another son, Joseph Henry Garland would die in 1931. From information kindly provided by Patsy Wardell.
